William took great pride in his work. He especially enjoyed solving unusual repair problems that others were unable to fix. He was also devoted to his church donating time, money and his talents for numerous church projects. He was a long-serving member of the Knights of Columbus. He retired from working at the shop in 1984 and began to build a house for their retirement. Each detail was crafted by hand with his amazing skills, down to kitchen cupboards made from old oak church pews. William, Frances and Mary enjoyed this home until the loss of Frances in 2002. William also built a workshop where he spent his days on woodwork projects, and crafting inventions to make life easier. He took pride in his vard work, and spent many hours gardening right up until his death at 90 years of age. His last project was putting a new roof on his deck which he finished last Thurs.
